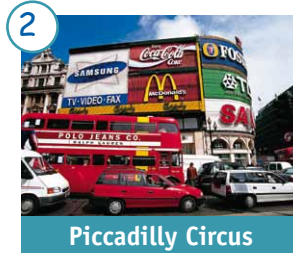

The London Transport Museum is a great place to learn about how people in London travelled in the past. Visitors can look at old buses and trains. There are old posters and photos as well. You can see some old uniforms, too.

The museum is very big now but it was much smaller when it first opened in Covent Garden in 1980. It is very easy to find, just take the tube to Covent Garden station and walk from there. The museum is open every day from 10am until 6pm, or from 11pm until 6pm on Fridays. The tickets cost £15 for adults and £11.50 for children.

The museum has got three big rooms. At the top of the building visitors can learn about transport in London in the 19th Century (1800-1899), when many people travelled in carriages pulled by horses. In the next room you can find out about the London Underground from 1863-1905. The last room is on the ground floor. This room is about transport in the 20th Century (1900-1999). The museum has got a nice café and a shop, too. There is a second part of the museum, in West London. The big buses and trains could not fit into the building in Covent Garden, so they are in West London. There are more than 370,000 things to see in this building but it is only open on special days of the year. On some days there are special events when visitors can ride on some of the old buses or trains. It is always lots of fun for families and children.
